Carbon Neutral Project Launch



In a pioneering move towards environmental responsibility, the Church of South India (CSI) Madhya Kerala Diocese has launched its ambitious Carbon Neutral Project, signalling a profound shift towards a culture that harmonises human life with nature. Speaking at the inaugural function, Rt. Rev. Dr. Sabu Koshy Cherian, Bishop of the Diocese, emphasised the project as a vital alternative to globalisation and consumer culture.

"The church is advocating for a rhythmic life in harmony with nature," Bishop Cherian declared. "This initiative is our response to climate change, underscoring that our pastoral mission extends beyond Sunday worship and rituals to addressing societal issues."

Bishop Cherian highlighted the church's proactive stance, particularly in suppor ting vulnerable and financially insecure communities increasingly affected by climate change. He urged local action, stating, "We must act at the local level rather than placing blame solely on developed countries. Terms like mitigation and adaptation are crucial, and there are practical steps the church can undertake."

CSI has adopted a Green Protocol for the Church's mission and ministry. It is the only church in India that has environmental protection enshrined in its constitution. International bodies such as the UNDP and UNESCO have recognised the Church's initiatives.

The Diocese has released a comprehensive booklet outlining energy and water

conservation schemes and waste management schemes. Bishop Cherian urged all congregation members and local communities to undergo self-audits biannually, with parishes printing and distributing audit samples to households. "Each parish should designate a person to document these efforts," he added. The youth, termed the church's 'green ambassadors, ' will play a pivotal role, particularly on Environment Sunday, June 9, when environmental protection will be advocated in 400 churches.



Kerala Government Minister V. N. Vasavan praised the diocese's carbon-neutral initiative, particularly its projects on solar energy generation in churches, schools, and homes. The minister inaugurated the program by lighting a lamp and planting a jackfruit sapling, symbolizing the start of planting 100,000 saplings.



Former Bishop Thomas Samuel underscored the spiritual significance of planting saplings, while Minister Vasavan honoured Kottayam CMS College, Mundiapally CSI Church, Kottayam Baker Vidyapeeth, and Kayamkulam Bishop Moore Vidyapeeth for their solar energy projects.Mr Thiruvanchoor Radhakrishnan, MLA, appreciated the diocese's work during his address. Dr T. N. Seema, State Co ordinator of the Green Mission, pledged the Kerala Government's full support for the carbon-neutral project.



Dr. Joseph Mar Dionysius Metropolitan inaugurated the Students' Campaign for Climate Justice and awarded certificates to 110 children who completed the Green Ambassadors course. Minister V.N. Vasavan also released "Gospel for the Earth," a book by Dr. Mathew Koshy Punnakkadu, enhancing the narrative of ecological consciousness within a biblical background.

Journey Towards Carbon Neutrality: A Commitment by CSI Madhya Kerala

On May 21, the Church of South India (CSI) Madhya Kerala embarked on a transformative journey to convert all 400 parishes and institutions into carbon-neutral entities. This initiative, known as CSI Carbon-Neutral Parishes and Institutions, is a proactive measure to address the potential disasters induced by climate change at a local level.

CSI acknowledges the urgent need for concerted and meaningful action as the impacts of climate change escalate. The gravity of this global crisis is underscored by the alarming rise in global warming, primarily driven by the increase in greenhouse gases. Carbon dioxide, a greenhouse gas with a lifetime spanning hundreds of years, remains in the atmosphere far longer than other gases, contributing to the annual increase in warming. The primary source of carbon dioxide is the combustion of fossil fuels such as petrol and coal. The relentless pursuit of economic growth by developed nations has significantly elevated atmospheric carbon dioxide levels from 280 parts per million (ppm) two centuries ago to a concerning 440 ppm recently, highlighting the situation's urgency.

Despite the efforts of 28 Conference of Parties (COP) meetings aimed at curbing global warming, the reluctance of developed countries to significantly reduce carbon emissions exacerbates the crisis. CSI asserts that developed nations, whose actions have precipitated global warming in pursuit of excessive profits, must re-evaluate their development paradigms. The CSI advocates for developing and disseminating carbon-free technology, particularly to developing countries that bear the brunt of climate change yet contribute minimally to its causes. This shift from a carbon economy to one reliant on solar and hydrogen is essential.

The principle of 'Think Global, Act Local' is not just a guiding principle for the CSI, but a call to action for all. Local churches, including you, play a crucial role in mitigating the effects of climate change by adhering to green practices and policies. Through the collaborative

project' Net Zero Carbon,' in partnership with the Green Mission of the Government of Kerala, the CSI aims to achieve carbon neutrality at the parish level, empowering you to be a part of this global movement.

A carbon-neutral society seeks to balance carbon dioxide emissions through reduction and offsetting measures. This journey begins with calculating carbon emissions within a specific area and undertaking measures like afforestation to absorb equivalent amounts of carbon dioxide. While precise estimation of carbon emissions can be challenging for parishes, their participation in various carbon offset projects can significantly reduce overall emissions.

Meaningful change starts with the collective efforts of individuals and communities dedicated to a healthy Earth, prioritising sustainable development. The Church's mission includes working towards a world where all living beings coexist in unity and peace. Unique among Indian churches, CSI's constitution explicitly includes environmental protection as a fundamental aspect of its mission. This commitment dates back to 1992, establishing a department dedicated to environmental protection at the Synod level. Today, ecological departments or committees exist in all dioceses as part of this vision.

The Diocese has approved "The Ten Commandments for Carbon-Neutral Parishes and Institutions" to support this mission. These guidelines aim to provide practical steps towards achieving carbon neutrality.

The Church of South India's (GSD Central Kerala diocese is launching an ambitious plan to achieve carbon neutrality across all its 405 parishes. Cooperation Minister V.N. Vasavan will inaugurate the initiative at a function here on Tuesday, which will be presided over by Bishop Malayil Sabu Koshy Cherian of the Central Kerala diocese.

Agriculture Minister P. Prasad will kick off a sapling planting project, and Thiruvanchoor Radhakrishnan, MLA, will unveil a home-based solar project. Harita Mission vice-chairperson T.N. Seema will deliver the keynote address.

For schoolchildren Joseph Mar Divanosis Metropolitan will launch the Schoolchildren's Campaign for Climate Justice. A book titled Bhoomikkapulla Savishesham, authored by Mathew Koshi Punnaikkad, will be released on the occasion.

The diocese aims to achieve carbon neutrality within three years through a 15-point programme. Key strategies include extensive solar energy use, the planting of over one lakh saplings, enhanced water conservation efforts, improved waste management practices, and a reduction in the carbon footprints of church members.

In a bid to raise awareness among schoolchildren, 405 trained students will speak on the importance of environmental conservation and carbon neutrality in each parish on June 9, serving as green ambassadors for the diocese's ecological mission.


